	 Understands what they read by: checking that the book makes sense to them, discussing their understanding and exploring the meaning of words in context and asking questions to improve their understanding.

	Discusses and evaluates how authors use language, including figurative language, considering the impact on the reader independently.

	Retrieves, records and presents information from non- fiction.
	 Participates in discussions about books that are read to them and those they can read for themselves, building on their own and others ideas and challenging views courteously explaining and discussing their understanding of what they have read, including through formal presentations and debates, maintaining a focus on the topic and using notes where necessary and providing reasoned justifications for their views.
